
IN MEMORIAM



Lewis Hill Jenkins, Sr. April 28, 1926 - October 31, 2103

On Thursday, October 31, 2013, with the death of Lewis Hill Jenkins, Sr., 87, of Wilkesboro, North Carolina, the entire Buick community lost a loyal, distinguished and knowledgeable friend.

Funeral services will be held at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, November 3, 2013 at the Reins-Sturdivant Chapel, 270 Armory Road, North Wilkesboro, North Carolina, 28697 (336-838-3178) with Dr. N. Nelson Granade, Jr. and the Rev. Brian Sampson officiating. Burial will be in Mountlawn Memorial Park, 196 Fan Key Road, North Wilkesboro, North Carolina, 28659. The family will receive at Reins-Sturdivant Funeral Home from 1:00 p.m. until 2:45 p.m. prior to the funeral service.

Lewis Hill Jenkins, Sr. was born in Wilkes County, North Carolina, on April 28, 1926, to Charles Edward and Sallie Vannoy Jenkins. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of North Wilkesboro. Mr. Jenkins was the chairman of the flood control committee that was instrumental in the building of the W. Kerr Scott Reservoir. He was appointed by Governor Jim Holshouser to the Environmental Management Commission. He was a member of the Commerce Development Board. He had served on the Wilkes Regional Medical Center Board of Directors. Mr. Jenkins was currently serving on the Wilkes County Airport Authority Board. He was also a member of the Antique Auto Club of America and the Buick Club of America.

Mr. Jenkins was the past president of The National Building District Association and a past member of the North Wilkesboro Board of Education, Board of Trustees of Wilkes Community College and the Board of Governors at Appalachian State University.

During World War II, Mr. Jenkins served his country honorably in the Army Air Corps as the Captain of a Boeing B-17 Flying Fortress, flying multiple bombing missions over Germany. Mr. Jenkins successfully piloted his B-17 back to England saving the lives of almost his entire air crew after his Flying Fortress was struck by flack, killing his co-pilot and severely damaging the aircraft.

Mr. Jenkins' successful businesses included Jenkins Wholesale, Corporate Coach and his widely acclaimed automobile restoration business, known as Jenkins Restoration. Mr. Jenkins had been active at Jenkins Restoration up until just before his death.

In addition to his parents, Mr. Jenkins was preceded in death by a daughter, Nancy Jenkins. Mr. Jenkins is survived by one daughter, Mary Vann Swiggett of Thomasville; one son, Lewis "Hill" Jenkins, Jr. of North Wilkesboro; three grandchildren, Martha Vannoy Swiggett, Mary Elizabeth Buckner, Lewis Hill Jenkins, III; extended family, Elizabeth Susie Harris, Charly Harris Ferguson, Cassidy and Tre' Lowe.
